Clan History MacPherson

The Clan Macpherson is part of the Clan Chattan Confederation and originated from a 15th century descendant of the Clan Chattan chief named Duncan, known as 'the Parson'. He was known as 'The Parson' because he collected tithes in the parish of Laggan, and his descendants became known as Macphersons. The name means 'son of the parson' in Gaelic and comes from Duncan, the son of Muriach Cattenach, who was the chief of Clan Chattan in 1173.

Today, the Clan is known for being the 'guardians of the heart of the Scottish Highlands' and is sometimes referred to as the 'Clan of the Three Brothers" after Ewan Ban Macpherson's three sons, who became the ancestors of the Macphersons of Clunie, Pitmain, and



Invereshie. In 1309, Robert the Bruce granted the lands of Badennoch to the MacPhersons for defeating his enemies, the Clan Comyn and in 1370, the Macphersons joined the Clan Chattan at Invernahavon in a battle against Clan Cameron. The feud between Clan Chattan and the Camerons continued for many years. Then in 1396 a battle of champions was fixed to be held on the North Inch of Perth before Robert III and his whole court and Sir Walter Scott gave a vivid description of this bizarre encounter in 'The Fair Maid of Perth'.

Andrew MacPherson, reckoned as the eighth chief, acquired the abbey-castle grange in Strathisla in 1618. His son, Euan, was a great royalist and fought with Montrose during the civil war. Duncan MacPherson of Cluny, the tenth chief, became a famous Highland leader in the Forty-five. During the retreat from Derby he defeated a numerically superior force at Clifton Moor in Northumberland. During the Jacobite rebellion of 1745, clan chief Ewan MacPherson (known simply as Cluny MacPherson) raised 400 men in support of Chrles Edward Stuart's doomed attempt to retore the Stuart dynasty to the British throne. After the defeat at Culloden, Cluny was able, through the faithful support his loyal clansmen, to escape capture by Hanoverian troops for nine years, despite a reward of £1,000 for his capture. Part of this time he had several notable lairs, including Cluny's Cave on an inaccessible cliff above Newtonmore and Cluny's Cage, a hut on the sloes of Ben Alder immortalised in Robert Louis Stevenson's adventure story 'Kidnapped'. Cluny finally escaped to France in 1755.

Nowadays the Clan MacPherson is a leading member of the Clan Chattan Confederation, a group of clans that united for mutual protection

The 28th Chief of Clan Macpherson, James Brodie Macpherson of Cluny



James Brodie Macpherson of Cluny is the 28th hereditary chief of the Clan Macpherson of Cluny (Cluny-Macpherson). Born on 5th June 1972, he was educated at Summer Fields, Oxford; before going to Fettes College, Edinburgh; and then on to Guilford College, in Greensboro, North Carolina where he obtained a BSc in Sports Management and Business. On his return to Scotland, after working with Whitbread plc in London, he joined Ben Sayers Golf Company as a Commercial Manager before going into property and thereafter he set up his own property business in Melrose, aptly named Macpherson Property. In 2002 Jamie married Annie Alexandra Macpherson, a company director and a daughter of The Lord and Lady Macpherson of Drumochter, who was co-incidentally the son of one of the co-founders of the Clan Macpherson Association in 1947.

Farewell to a Jolly Good Fellow

Our treasurer, Elizabeth sent us details of the passing of a fine, yet somewhat eccentric gentleman, Ian Lamond, at the age of 88. Ian was, for many years, a member of HVSC and attended every Scottish event in NSW, always travelling by train from Bowral. He was a unique and extraordinary Scotsman with a heart of gold. Elizabeth recalls "Ian was a wonderfully unusual fellow, who I first met when he insisted on catching a train to the backpacker's hostel in Newcastle at 10pm ... dressed in a kilt! Typically, he was quite oblivious to the danger to which he was exposed. Since then, he has had a big influence on my life, and we have spent



many happy times Scottish country dancing, gardening, reminiscing and philosophising". May he rest in peace.
