Management Committee



With the cooler weather maybe you might like to try a Bannock

Bannock (a variety of flatbread or quick bread common in Scotland)

Ingredients

17g sachet of fast-action yeast
1 tsp caster sugar
500g strong white flour
125g unsalted butter, melted
250g dried mixed fruit
50g light muscovado sugar (can use dark brown sugar)
Beaten egg for glazing

Method

Mix together the yeast, caster sugar and 250ml lukewarm water in a large bowl. Stand for 10 minutes until mixture is frothy.

Add flour and butter and mix thoroughly. Tip onto a lightly floured surface and knead for about 5 minutes to form a smooth elastic dough.

Place the dough into a lightly oiled bowl and cover with a damp tea towel. Leave in a warm place for about an hour or until doubled in size.

When the dough has risen, punch the dough down. Tip onto a lightly floured surface and knead in the fruit and muscovado sugar until well combined.

Shape the dough into a round shape and place onto a baking sheet. Cover with a damp tea towel and leave to rise in a warm place for 30 minutes or until it has doubled in size.

Brush the Bannock with a little beaten egg to glaze. Bake in an oven at 180c for 45-50 minutes until risen and a rich brown colour. When the bread is ready it will sound hollow when tapped gently underneath.

Cool slightly before slicing and serving warm with plenty of butter.

Is the Loch Ness Monster an eel?

Sightings of the 'Loch Ness Monster' date back to 1933, but despite many attempts to prove its existence nothing has been proven.

I recall reading an article some years ago suggesting that maybe the Loch Ness monster is a large eel. I googled and found that in 2019 scientists from Otago University, New Zealand have been testing DNA from the loch and found that there were no reptilian sequences – so they are pretty sure there is not a giant scaly reptile swimming around in Loch Ness ie no plesiosaur or elasmosaurus which had survived the extinction of the dinosaurs.

The chief scientist reporting on the study, Gemmel, did say that they have come to understand more fully the biodiversity of Loch Ness but they had not totally killed off the legend of the Monster. They found a large volume of eel DNA but he was sceptical of the theory that 'eels would normally migrate to reproduce, but if they don't migrate they may continue to grow to a very large size'. He mentioned that the record catch for an European eel is 5.38kg, hardly a monster. But based on the evidence they have accumulated, they can't exclude it as a possibility.
